Blond Bay

The sad state of Blond Bay State Game Reserve and its hog deer were discussed at the last Committee meeting. A number of initiatives could be implemented to try to turn the situation around. It would be good to get support from the members to help with this.

Clamping down on poaching was seen to be the highest priority, particularly in the months prior to balloted hunting commencing.

- Branch reps will be approaching the Game Management Authority to lift their involvement the GMA needs to recognise the importance of these deer, establish a presence in the reserve and also liaise with local landowners and hunters to keep tabs on illegal activities.
- "Poacher patrols" by ADA members could also be re-instated.
- Surveillance cameras could be installed and trialled to see whether they are useful in gathering information on those using and abusing the area.
- Sambar, roos and foxes need to be controlled on the adjoining private property and to minimise the risk of this being used as a cover for poaching. Branch members could carry out this role for landowners.

An attempt will be made to organise a meeting with the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning and Parks Victoria to inform them of the importance of this deer population and to explore options for their better management.

A tour of the area by Branch members is probably required to look at other issues such as off-road driving, poor track maintenance, vehicle damage to tracks and wetlands and rubbish dumping. Improving the habitat in the reserve for hog deer was discussed but given the constraints on Parks Victoria change is likely to be difficult.

Hunting About

As mentioned to previously plenty of animals have been taken in the short time allowed so far. And quite a few nice stags among them.

Local hunter Cath Rayment knocked over a beauty. 26x26x29 with all the fruit (see cover

photo). Solid beams, shangi tops and big brows. I haven't seen it in the flesh yet but it looks very impressive in the photo. A very pleased Cath told me that she took the stag on a "sit and wait" hunt on some local fringe country. Cath said that right on last light, the stag marched out rather than crept out as if it was on a mission. She said that she had to yell Oi! Twice to get to stop before it walked out of view. Using her .325WSM Browning X Bolt off shooting sticks Cath took the shot from ninety metres. The 200Gn Barns XXX did its job, taking the stag cleanly though both shoulders. As usual with big bodied stags it bolted into the thick scrub and took a



bit of finding due to there being very little blood. From Cath's description the stag was a true "Bull" in the 300 kilo range. It took two men to be able role it over when doing the caping and butchering. Cath is a very accomplished hunter and has taken in excess of fifty deer in the past few years. This one by far the biggest and best. Well done Cath.

He did say that if he hadn't been able to walk or tend to the wound effectively he would have had to deploy his PLB (Personal Locator Beacon). As it was he had to endure a painful hobble of a few kilometres back to the car. The Doc fished out

remnants of sticks and bark back at hospital. Followed by the inevitable stiches and the good old tetanus shot.

Doug is well on the way to recovery and I'm sure he will be back our on the hill in no time.



Apologies: Nil.

Correspondence: Invoice for the post office box - \$139, and an account from the Bairnsdale Advertiser for the advert notifying the cancellation of the April meeting - \$86.46.

Treasurer's Report: Balance in bank of \$4688.46. A report was sent to National in March itemising transactions for the past year.

General Business:

Shelley reported that she had ordered polo tops, hats and stickers. Tops with logo to cost \$32 and hats with logo \$20.

There will be no June meeting but it is hoped that a meeting can be held in August. A notice to be put on Facebook regarding the June meeting and a newsletter needs to be sent out in the next two weeks. Material is needed for the newsletter.

There was discussion of Executive positions for the coming year – Bruce and Shelley are keen to step away but no-one was keen to fill their roles. Members to approach Brett Mills, Wayne Lawson, Peter McDonell and other prospects to sound them out.

There was discussion of the Wairewa Project, but the area north of the highway has been burnt and is still too dangerous to hunt. DELWP are still keen to pursue deer control south of the Highway.

Fundraising and a repeat of a major raffle was discussed. A rifle, chainsaw, binoculars and fuel were suggested as prizes and 500 tickets to be arranged.

The sad state of Blond Bay State Game Reserve and its hog deer were discussed. An informal ADA group could pursue publicity, liaison with farmers and GMA, anti-poacher activities, rubbish removal, roo and sambar control etc or a formal "Friends" group could be formed to try to achieve these activities plus habitat management. The dead hand of Parks Victoria was suggested to be a reason for not trying to create a Friends group. Ken Slee to organise a tour of the reserve to look at issues and possible responses.

A New Member Pack was discussed made up of a welcoming letter, a GMA meat bag and other inexpensive items. The prospect of a 2021 calendar was raised but this requires high quality photos and advertising to make it viable.

The meeting closed at a little after 9:30PM.
